Screening for SDoH at The Portland Clinic *

Speaker: Paige Fredrick, BSN, RN, Director of Population Health, The Portland Clinic

The Portland Clinic screens patients for social determinants of health using an internally created screening tool with questions from the AAFP and Arlington. Our screening tool evaluates patients for difficulty affording/accessing food, medications, transportation and/or housing. Patients are screened annually, and those who screen positive are referred to our social work care managers who provide and assist patients with community resources. Patients with significant or more complicated needs are enrolled in care management so we can provide them with more intensive support. We also partner with local organizations to develop innovative programs to expand our resource offerings to patients. We are currently partnering with the American Heart Association to offer vouchers to a local farmers market to our patients who screen positive for food insecurity.

Not Just a Side Thought Anymore: How to Engage Specialists in Value Based Care*

Speaker: Scott Hines, MD, Chief Quality Officer, Optum Tristate, Crystal Run Health

Specialty care accounts for more than half of office visits to physicians and drive nearly 70% of healthcare expenditure in the United States. If an ACO is to succeed in lowering cost it is imperative that efforts are made to engage specialists. Crystal Run Healthcare has found that the three greatest drivers of specialty engagement are transparent data sharing, tying a portion of compensation to ACO competencies, and developing value based programs to support specialists in delivering care to their sickest patients. However, prior to implementing these strategies specialists must understand why focusing on value based care over fee for service is better for their patients, better for their quality of life, and better for the organization they work for. Only then will an ACO unlock the true potential of their specialty providers.

Electronic Clinical Quality Measures (eCQM) Reporting – Preparing Your ACO for 2025 Reporting Requirements *

Medicare Shared Savings Program (MSSP) Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs) have been preparing to quality reporting policy changes that will go into effect by 2025. For performance year (PY) 2025, MSSP ACOs are required to report three core quality measures via electronic clinical quality measures (eCQMs) or clinical quality measure (CQMs) or Medicare CQMs. The policy changes to the reporting framework are considerably different from the current state as it moves from viewing performance on a small sample of beneficiaries to all eligible patients. For large ACOs, current processes will not scale thus requiring a revisit to performance improvement. Additionally, the new reporting frameworks have differences that must be considered when evaluating the best option for a particular ACO.
