**Prejudice: Have Some Pride** 

For the first time in its more than 40-year history, the Human Rights

Campaign issued a state of emergency for LGBTQIA+ individuals because of laws targeting the community, many of which have passed in states across the U.S. Political campaigns, parliamentary debates, and public exhibitions reveal social prejudice and misconceptions about the nature and moral character of LGBTQIA+ persons around the world.



Ultraconservative and ultranationalist groups are also on the rise, leading to outright prejudice and legislative actions against sexual and gender minorities, challenging advances made by the community, and preventing the development of laws and policies inclusive of LGBTQIA+ people.

As allies, it is particularly important that we remember every person, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity, deserves equal access to opportunities and services, and their safety should be protected.

One of the ways allies can support LGBTQIA+ individuals on a daily basis is to acknowledge chosen pronouns and identities. In our recent DE&I training and discussion den, this issue was discussed. Using chosen pronouns is a form of inclusion and allyship, recognizing the unique identity individuals have chosen for themselves. It is our visible and invisible uniqueness that brings value to the world, and inclusion is the key to unleash the power of our rich diversity.
