Did You Know?

We're all familiar with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech and other notable strides he made as a Baptist minister and social activist who led the civil rights movement (i.e., the Montgomery bus boycott, organizing the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), the letter from Birmingham Jail, etc.). But did you know that after her first season on Star Trek Nichelle Nichols wanted to quit, and it was King that convinced her to continue playing the role of Lieutenant Uhura? King knew that representation and inclusion mattered. He told her that playing this role was helping the movement, as she was playing a new role for a black person in cinema – one that was intelligent and inspiring. Nichols ultimately decided to stay on Star Trek and served as a role model for many, including Whoopi Goldberg, who has acknowledged that seeing Nichols as Uhura was meaningful to her as a child.
