## UC San Diego Health ADULT SEASONAL INFLUENZA VACCINE STANDING ORDER

For Use During Flu Season Only (September-April)

Under this standing order, eligible nurses (i.e., RN and LVNs), MAs (in unlicensed clinics only) and pharmacists may vaccinate adults in the **outpatient setting** who meet the criteria below.

Procedure:

- 1. Identify eligible persons: adults age 18 or older only.
- 2. Screen all patients for contraindications and precautions to influenza vaccine and refer any of these or other issues to a physician for further evaluation:
  - a. **Severe allergic reaction** (anaphylaxis or any symptom other than hives) after ingesting eggs or a previous dose of influenza vaccine or an influenza vaccine component.
  - b. Moderate or severe acute illness with or without fever.
  - c. History of Guillain-Barré syndrome.
- 3. Provide patient with the most current Vaccine Information Statement (VIS) from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC): <u>https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/vis/vis-statements/flu.pdf</u>
- 4. Determine appropriate vaccine for patient, all influenza vaccines from the UCSD pharmacy are latex free.
  - a. For ages 18 64, use inactivated influenza vaccine (e.g., Fluarix).
  - b. For patients with egg allergies, egg free, use preservative free FluBlok Quadrivalent, or Flucelvax
  - c. For ages 65 and older or transplant recipients, use **high-dose inactivated** influenza vaccine (e.g., Fluad or FluZone High-Dose).
- 5. Enter as standing order in the electronic medical record (Epic). Document vaccine lot number, expiration date, and VIS date.
- Administer inactivated influenza vaccine or high-dose inactivated influenza vaccine: 0.5 mL IM (22–25 gauge, 1–1½" needle) at a 90 degree angle in the deltoid muscle. For patients weighing 91 kg (200 lbs) or more a longer needle may be necessary: use a 22–25 gauge, 1 ½" needle at a 90 degree angle in the deltoid muscle.
- 6. Complete vaccine administration documentation in the electronic medical record. Document vaccine administration in the patient's personal immunization record card, if provided.
- 7. Refer any issues or concerns about the vaccine to a physician.
- 8. Report all adverse reactions to influenza vaccine or medication errors in UCSD's iReport event reporting system.
